Divine Mercy Sunday

On this, the first Sunday after the celebration of Easter, the emphasis is on faith in the presence and power of the living Jesus in our midst. This Risen Jesus now lives on in the community which believes in Him.

The Gospel, brings us back to an earlier stage when the disciples have not yet come to the full realization that Jesus, whom they saw crucified, dead and buried, is now alive, that He is risen. He breathed on them, saying: "Receive the Holy Spirit." The very empowering authority of Jesus is transferred to them: "Whose sins you shall forgive... whose sins you shall retain..." When they act together in the name of Jesus, they have His authority. And, above all, their task is to "forgive sin", that is, to bring about a deep reconciliation between people and God, and among people themselves, to make all one in Him. But the story is not yet finished. Thomas, "one of the Twelve," was not there on that Easter Sunday. He stands for the skeptic in all of us. "Unless I see with my own eyes ... I will not believe." The following Sunday – the Sunday we are celebrating today, Thomas is directly addressed. "Put your finger here; look at my hands. Put your hand in my side. Don't doubt any longer but believe." There follows the greatest confession of faith in all of the gospels: "My Lord and my God!" Thomas had been invited to touch the wounds, but he does not seem to have done so, and his cry of recognition is not based only on the evidence of his senses. He does not say, "Jesus, it's you!" but "My Lord and my God!"

Student Senior Isolation Prevention Partnership - A group of students at McMaster and the University of Waterloo have started the Mac-Waterloo-Niagara Student Senior Isolation Prevention Partnership (SSIPP) to assist socially isolated seniors during the COVID outbreak. Our program pairs student volunteers with socially isolated older adults to check-in via weekly phone calls in order to provide social comfort and standard patient education about COVID-19.

Older adults living in the Hamilton, Waterloo, or Niagara regions can be referred through a member of their **healthcare team or community organizations** to the program. At the moment, we have over 100 healthcare professional students signed up to help us (many of whom speak different languages).

Many older adults are looking to have someone to speak to and are interested in this type of program, **however we need help identifying them.**

Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska



The Humble Instrument

Sister Faustina was a young, uneducated nun in a convent of the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Poland, during the 1930s. She came from a poor family that struggled during the years of World War I. She had only three years of simple education, so hers were the humblest tasks in the convent, usually in the kitchen or garden. However, she received extraordinary revelations — or messages — from our Lord Jesus. Jesus asked Sr. Faustina to record these experiences. which she compiled notebooks. These notebooks are known today as the Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, and the words contained within are God's loving message of Divine Mercy.

Though the Divine Mercy message is not new to the teachings of the Church, Sr. Faustina's Diary sparked a great movement, and a strong and significant focus on the mercy of Christ. Saint John Paul II canonized Sr. Faustina in 2000 making her the "first saint of the new millennium." Speaking of Sr. Faustina and the importance of the message contained in her Diary, the Pope called her "the great apostle of Divine Mercy in our time."

Sister Faustina was born on August 25, 1905 in Glogowiec, Poland to a poor and religious family of peasants, the third of 10 children. She was baptized with the name Helena in the parish church of Swinice Warckie. From a very tender age she stood out because of her love of prayer, work, obedience, and also her sensitivity to the poor. At the age of seven she had already felt the first stirrings of a religious vocation. Helen made her first Holy Communion at the age of nine, which was a very profound moment in her awareness of the presence of the Divine Guest within her soul. She attended school for three years. After finishing school, she wanted to enter the convent, but her parents would not give her permission. Being of age at 16, Helen left home and went to work as a housekeeper in Aleksandrów, Lodi, and Ostrówek in order to find a means of supporting herself and of helping her parents.

Helen never lost her desire for a religious vocation. After being called during a vision of the Suffering Christ, she entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy on August 1, 1925, and took the name Sr. Maria Faustina of the Most Blessed Sacrament. She lived in the Congregation for thirteen years in several religious houses. She spent time at Krakow, Plock and Vilnius, where she worked as a cook, gardener and porter. Externally, nothing revealed her rich mystical interior life. She zealously performed her tasks and faithfully observed the rule of religious life. She was recollected and at the same time very natural, serene, and full of kindness.

Although her life was apparently insignificant, monotonous and dull, she hid within herself an extraordinary union with God. It is the mystery of the Mercy of God which she contemplated in the word of God as well as in the everyday activities of her life, that forms the basis of her spirituality. The process of contemplating and getting to know the mystery of God's mercy helped develop within Sr. Maria Faustina the attitude of child-like trust in God as well as mercy toward her neighbors.

Sister Faustina was a faithful daughter of the Church, which she loved like a Mother, and the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ. Conscious of her role in the Church, she cooperated with God's mercy in the task of saving lost souls. At the specific request of and following the example of the Lord Jesus, she made a sacrifice of her own life for this very goal. In her spiritual life she also distinguished herself with a love of the Eucharist and a deep devotion to the Mother of Mercy.

The Secretary of God's Mercy

The Lord Jesus chose Sr. Maria Faustina as the Apostle and "Secretary" of His Mercy, so that she could tell the world about His great message, which Sr. Faustina recorded in a diary she titled "Divine Mercy in My Soul". In the Old Covenant, He said to her: "I sent prophets wielding thunderbolts to My people. Today I am sending you with My mercy to the people of the whole world. I do not want to punish aching mankind, but I desire to heal it, pressing it to My Merciful Heart." (Diary, 1588)

In an extraordinary way, Sr. Maria Faustina's work sheds light on the mystery of the Divine Mercy. It delights not only the simple and uneducated person, but also scholars who look upon it as an additional source of theological research. Sister Maria Faustina, consumed by tuberculosis and by innumerable sufferings which she accepted as a voluntary sacrifice for sinners, died in Krakow at the age of just 33 on

October 5, 1938, with a reputation for spiritual maturity and a mystical union with God. The reputation of the holiness of her life grew, as did the cult to the Divine Mercy and the graces obtained from God through her intercession. In the years 1965-67, the Investigative Process into her life and heroic virtues was undertaken in Krakow and in the year 1968, the Beatification Process was initiated in Rome. The latter came to an end in December 1992. On April 18, 1993 our Holy Father, John Paul II, raised St. Faustina to the glory of the altar. She was canonized on April 30, 2000. St. Maria Faustina's remains rest at the Sanctuary of the Divine Mercy in Krakow-Lagiewniki.
