

Sixth Sunday of Easter

The Gospel this Sunday is from St. John 14:15-21. Jesus said to His disciples: "If you love me you will keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father, and He will give you another Advocate to be with you forever, that Spirit of truth whom the world can never receive since it neither sees nor knows Him, but you know Him, because He is with you, He is in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come back to you." In today's reading, Jesus offers encouragement to His disciples, who will soon see Him crucified. He reassures them that even though He will leave them, He will not abandon them. Instead He will send them the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, through whom the disciples will continue to live in union with Jesus.

During these two thousand years, great empires have risen and fallen. They had large armies, vast wealth and earthly resources at their disposal, yet they disintegrated, like all things human. In the midst of all these upheavals, the Church of Christ, has continued to flourish, because it has been directed and sustained by the Holy Spirit, who abides within it. As we continue our journey through Easter, we will be blessed, with the gifts of Christ's Peace and encouraged by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Family Connection

Gather your family and invite each family member to say what he or she knows about the Holy Spirit. Read aloud today's Gospel, John 14:15-21. What does Jesus say the Holy Spirit will do for the disciples? Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we come to share in the love of God made known to us in Jesus. Pray together, thanking God for this gift of the Holy Spirit.


100th anniversary of Saint John Paul II's birth.

Pope Francis will honor one of his predecessors during a live-streamed Mass on Monday, May 18th.

The ceremony will be held at Pope John II's tomb in honor of what would have been his 100th birthday. "In memory of the centenary of the birth of St. John Paul II, the Holy Father will celebrate the morning Mass live at 7:00 a.m. in the chapel of the saint's tomb in the Vatican Basilica."

Karol Wojtyła, known as John Paul II, since his October 1978 election to the papacy, was born in Wadowice, a small city 50 kilometres from Cracow, on May 18, 1920. He was the second of two sons born to Karol Wojtyła and Emilia Kaczorowska. His early life was marked by great loss. His mother died in 1929. His eldest brother Edmund, a doctor, died when he was 12 and his father, a non-commissioned army officer died in 1941. He made his First Holy Communion at age 9 and was confirmed at 18. Growing up, John Paul was athletic and enjoyed skiing and swimming. He went to Kraków's Jagiellonian University in 1938 where he showed an interest in theater and poetry. The school was closed the next year by Nazi troops, during the German occupation of Poland and young Karol had to work in a quarry (1940-1944) and then in the Solvay chemical factory to earn his living and to avoid being deported to Germany. In 1942, aware of his call to the priesthood, he began courses in the clandestine seminary of Cracow, run by Cardinal Adam Stefan Sapieha, Archbishop of Cracow. At the same time, Karol Wojtyła was one of the pioneers of the "Rhapsodic Theatre", also clandestine.

After the Second World War, he continued his studies in the major seminary of Cracow, once it had re-opened, and in the faculty of theology of the Jagiellonian University, until his priestly ordination in Cracow on November 1, 1946.



Soon after, Cardinal Sapieha sent him to Rome, where he worked under the guidance of the French Dominican, Garrigou-Lagrange. He finished his doctorate in theology in 1948, with a thesis on the topic of faith in the works of St. John of the Cross. At that time, during his vacations, he exercised his pastoral ministry among the Polish immigrants of France, Belgium and Holland. John Paul II returned to his native Poland in 1948 and served in several parishes in and around Krakow. He was chaplain for the university students, as well, until 1951, when he took up again, his studies on philosophy and theology. In 1953 he defended his habilitation thesis on "evaluation of the possibility of founding a Christian ethic on the ethical system of Max Scheler" at the Faculty of Theology, of the Jagiellonian University (It was the last habilitation before the closing of the Faculty by the Communist government). Later he became a professor of moral philosophy and social ethics in the major seminary of Cracow and in the Faculty of Philosophy, at the Catholic University of Lubin (where he became the Chair of Ethics, and lectured for 25 years, until he was elected Pope, in 1978).




On October 16, 1978, John Paul made history by becoming the first non-Italian pope in more than four hundred years. As the leader of the Catholic Church, he traveled the world to spread his message of faith and peace. He completed 95 pastoral visits outside of Italy and 142 within Italy. As Bishop of Rome, he visited 301 of the 334 parishes. In 1981, an assassin shot John Paul, twice, in St. Peter's Square, in Vatican City. Fortunately, he was able to recover from his injuries and later forgave his attacker.

John Paul II died on April 2, 2005, at the age of 84, at his Vatican City residence. More than 3 million people waited in line to say good-bye to their beloved religious leader, at St. Peter's Basilica, before his funeral on April 8th.

The announcement of Pope John Paul II's canonization, came after the Vatican revealed that two miracles were attributed to the late pope. A dying French nun,

Sister Marie Simon-Pierre Normand, prayed to Pope John Paul II, during her battle with Parkinson's disease—the same illness that killed the pope—she was cured. The second miracle involved a 50-year-old woman, who claimed that she was cured of a brain aneurysm.

Liturgical commemoration takes place on May 21st

Saint Eugene de Mazenod was born in Aix-en-Provence, France on August 1, 1782 and baptized the following day in the Église de la Madeleine. He was beatified on October 19, 1975 by Pope Paul VI and canonized on December 3, 1995 by Pope John Paul II.

St. Eugene de Mazenod, the Founder of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate With the approach of the French revolutionary forces, the family was forced to flee to Italy. At the age of twenty, Eugene returned to France and lived with his mother in Aix-en-Provence. Initially he enjoyed all the pleasures of Aix, as a rich young nobleman. Gradually he became aware of how empty his life was and began to search for meaning in more regular church involvement, reading personal study, and charitable work among prisoners. His journey came to a climax one Good Friday, when he was 25 years old. Looking at the sight of the Cross he understood: "I had looked for happiness outside of God, but outside of Him I had found only affliction and disappointment."

A calling to the priesthood began to manifest itself, and Eugene answered that call. Despite opposition from his mother, he entered the Seminary of St. Sulpice, in Paris, and on December 21, 1811 he was ordained a priest in Amiens.

On January 25, 1816, "impelled by a strong impulse from outside of himself" he invited other priests to join him in his life of total oblation to God and to the most abandoned of Provence. Initially called "Missionaries of Provence," they dedicated themselves to evangelization through preaching parish missions, in the poor villages, youth and prison ministry. In 1818 a second community was established at the Marian shrine of Notre-Dame-du-Laus. This became the occasion for the missionaries to become a religious congregation, united through vows and the evangelical counsels. Changing their name to Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate, the group received papal approbation on February 17, 1826.



St. Eugene de Mazenod, the Founder of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate In 1841, Bishop Bourget, of Montreal, invited the Oblates to Canada. At the same time there was an outreach to the British Isles and Ireland. This was the beginning of an inspiring history of missionary outreach to the most abandoned peoples in Canada, the United States, Mexico, England and Ireland, Algeria, Southern Africa and Ceylon. In 200 years, this zeal spread and took root in the establishment of the Oblates in nearly 70 countries.

Legacy of a Saint

May 21, 1861, saw Eugene de Mazenod returning to his God, at the age of 79, after a life crowded with achievements, many of them born in suffering. For his religious family and for his diocese, he was a founding and life-giving source: for God and for the Church, he was a faithful and generous son. As he lay dying, he left his Oblates a final testament, "Among yourselves-charity, charity; in the world-zeal for souls."

The Church in declaring him a saint on December 3, 1995, crowns these two pivots of his living-love and zeal. His life and his deeds remain for all a window unto God Himself. And that is the greatest gift that Eugene de Mazenod, Oblate of Mary Immaculate, can offer us.
