Sunday Liturgy:

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The apostles gathered together with Jesus and reported all they had done and taught.

He said to them,

“Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while.”

In today’s Gospel (Mk 6:30-34), we read the report of the return of the Twelve, who were sent by Jesus to preach repentance, heal the sick, and drive out demons. When the Twelve return to Jesus, He invites them to come away from the crowds and rest. But the crowds will not give them peace. As the Twelve have shared in Jesus’ ministry, they now appear to share in His popularity.

The crowds continue to approach them, and Mark reports that the disciples don’t even have time to eat. In an effort to get away, Jesus and His disciples board a boat in hopes of finding a deserted place. But the crowds notice this and arrive ahead of them. The crowds are so persistent that Jesus and His disciples cannot find a place to be alone. Mark’s Gospel tells us that Jesus is moved with pity and begins to teach the crowds. **In today’s Gospel, we hear Jesus affirm the importance of times of rest and renewal.** Jesus wanted His disciples to come away and spend time alone with Him. This is what we seek and find in our life of prayer and in our celebration of the Eucharist.

17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly

Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, said to Him,

“There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish; but what good are these for so many?”

In John’s Gospel (J 6:1-15), Jesus’ multiplication of the loaves and the fishes is presented as a sign of His authority and divinity. Jesus interprets the meaning and significance of this miracle as a sharing of His Body and Blood. John’s Gospel notes the detail that the bread blessed and shared with the crowd are barley loaves. This is the food of the poor. It reminds us that God feeds and nourishes us, fulfilling our physical needs as well as our spiritual ones. In the Eucharist, we are sent to serve the poorest among us.

The story of the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes recalls a particular aspect of the Mass. In this miracle, Jesus transforms a young boy’s offering of five barley loaves and two fish. In the offertory at Mass, we present the fruits of our labors, represented by bread and wine. These gifts, given to us first by God as grain and fruit, are returned to God in our offering of thanksgiving. **God in turn transforms our gifts, making this bread and wine the very Body and Blood of Jesus.** We also offer ourselves in this exchange, and we, too, are transformed by the Eucharist.



Mass Intentions for 2021 – The offering of Mass for the deceased, the sick, a personal intention, in thanksgiving, a special intention such as an anniversary, birthday, etc. is an act of deep faith and a most excellent way of remembering a loved one. Please call the parish office if you would like to request a Mass.

Saturday Morning Masses during August – During the month of August, there will be no Saturday morning 9 a.m. Masses. Saturday morning Masses will resume in September.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

If a loved one or family member is seriously sick, please do not hesitate to contact the parish office early, so that the sick person is able to make a good Confession and receive the sacraments while he/she is fully aware. Thank you for your assistance in ensuring we provide good pastoral care to your family and loved ones.

Parish Bulletins – During July and August, the Parish Bulletin will be published bi-weekly.

Stage 3 Reopening of Parishes

As announced by Premier Ford, we have moved into Stage 3 of the Reopening Plan as of July 16, 2021. As such, you will notice that there will be some changes when you arrive for Mass this weekend. Some practices, however will not change.

In Stage 3, we continue to follow the guidelines of the Province of Ontario and the Diocese of Hamilton and ask that you please review the following so that you know what is expected and what to expect when coming to Mass:

- ❖ One-way movement for church entry and exit is retained.
- ❖ All who participate in the liturgy are to sanitize their hands before entering the church, wear masks for the duration of the celebration and maintain physical distancing.
- ❖ Priests and Extraordinary Ministers of Communion must wear masks for the distribution of Communion.
- ❖ Music leadership is restricted to an instrumentalist and cantor only. No hymnals will be in the pews.
- ❖ The collection is to be received at the doors of the church; not during the Offertory.
- ❖ The dispensation from the Sunday Obligation remains in effect at this time.

The following liturgical practices are now permitted:

- ❖ We may now re-introduce or increase the number of liturgical ministers: Lectors, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion as needed, Altar Servers.
- ❖ Resume the dialogue with individual communicants as they approach the minister for Communion (The Body of Christ/Amen).
- ❖ Following consultation with medical advisors, reception of Holy Communion on the tongue is now permitted. However, those who wish to receive the Eucharist in this manner are to do so after all others have received Communion in the hand and are to receive Communion from the Priest. We are reminded that the normative posture for receiving Communion in Canada is standing.

As printed bulletins are not permitted at this time, we will continue to publish the bulletin online and encourage you to check it for any further updates.

World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly

Pope Francis announced the establishment of a World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly at his Sunday Angelus in January of this year. The chosen day for the yearly celebration is the fourth Sunday of July, since it coincides with the feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne, Jesus' grandparents.

During his presentation, Pope Francis reminded us about grandparents: "Their voice is precious because it sings the praises of God and safeguards the roots of peoples. They remind us that old age is a gift and that grandparents are the link between generations, passing on the experience of life and faith to the young. Grandparents are often forgotten and we forget this wealth of preserving roots and passing on."

This year, the first World Day celebration will take place on Sunday, July 25 and the chosen theme is, "I am with you always".

PASTORAL GUIDELINES

The decision to hold a World Day for Grandparents and Older People has come at a time marked by a pandemic and by the suffering of our older generations in recent months in every part of the world. Reports of elderly people having to die alone and then not even being given a funeral, have been a cause of deep pain to the Church. It is one of the crosses of our time that was rightly brought to mind during the Way of the Cross with the Pope on Good Friday this year: "People jumped out of the ambulance dressed like astronauts, wearing protective suits, gloves, masks and face shields. They took away my grandfather who had been having difficulty breathing. That was the last time that I saw my grandfather. He died a few days later in hospital. I think of how lonely he must have felt. I could not be near him physically to say goodbye and to comfort him".

To be unable to be close to those who suffer is at odds with a Christian's calling to show compassion. This World Day is an opportunity to reaffirm that the Church can never remain distant from those who carry a cross. The theme chosen by the Holy Father, "I am with you always", expresses clearly that, during the pandemic and in the better times that will hopefully follow, every ecclesial community wishes to be with the elderly always.

VISITING GRANDPARENTS AND OLDER PEOPLE WHO ARE ALONE

The first World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly will be celebrated in circumstances in which it will still not be possible in many countries for the elderly to physically attend Mass. In order for the message of closeness and consolation to reach everyone on this World Day – even those who are most isolated we ask people to visit their grandparents and the elderly living alone in their community and to give them the Holy Father's message.

A visit is a tangible sign of a Church of outreach. At a time of social distancing because of the pandemic, a visit shows that there is a way of being close to older people while still observing safety measures. A visit is a personal choice to arise and go in haste to others (cf. Lk 1:39), just as Mary did when she visited her elderly cousin Elizabeth. A visit is an opportunity for a grandchild to say to his or her grandparent and for a young person to say to an elderly person they are visiting, "I am with you always".

A visit can be an opportunity to bring a gift, such as a flower, and to read the World Day prayer together. A visit can also be an occasion to offer the elderly, especially those who have not left their homes for a long time, an opportunity to receive the sacraments of reconciliation and the Eucharist. A visit to an older person living alone is one of the ways of obtaining a Plenary Indulgence granted on the occasion of this World Day.

PLENARY INDULGENCE

On 13 May, the Apostolic Penitentiary promulgated a Decree granting a Plenary Indulgence on the occasion of the World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly.

- The elderly can obtain an Indulgence by participating in one of the Masses celebrated on the occasion of this World Day.
- In view of the continuing health emergency and the fact that some elderly people are unable to attend Mass in person for health reasons, the Indulgence is extended to those who participate via television, radio or the internet.
- The Indulgence is also granted to all those who perform a 'work of mercy' on this World Day by visiting an elderly person who is alone.
- In places where visiting in person is expressly forbidden by the public authorities in order to avoid contagion, it is also possible to obtain the Indulgence through a virtual meeting.
